

Benefits of Early Childhood Education Statistics with Sources

- An average 10-point increase in IQ score compared to children who do not receive ECE.
- An 11 percent increase in high school graduation rates.
- A 15 percent reduction in repeating grade levels in school.
- A 10 percent reduction in special education placement.
- Mothers returning to work can generate an additional \$79,000 in lifetime earnings.
- A 10 percent increase in maternal workforce participation.
- A \$16 return on investment for every \$1 invested in ECE.
- Up to a 30 percent decrease in employee absences—this is estimated to cost that nation \$4.4 billion dollars annually.
- Up to a 60 percent decrease in employee turnover.
- Nearby ECE Centers increase property values by \$13 for every \$1 invested by the community.
- Families without affordable childcare lose \$8.3 billion dollars in wages annually.
- Almost two million American parents, and approximately 89,000 Pennsylvania parents, quit, did not take or greatly changed their job due to child care challenges.
- <u>It's estimated that employees leaving for better child care benefits cost their employers</u> upwards of 20 percent of their salary in hiring, training and productivity losses.
- In Pennsylvania, a married couple with two children pay, on average, 21.7 percent of their income towards care in a child care center setting, while a single parent pays 43.9 percent of their income for infant care in a child care center setting.
